In 1876, the Iowa Legislature appropriated \$25,000 for an association that would help develop Iowa's dairy industry. Those early visionaries realized that a vibrant dairy industry could help grow Iowa's economy, improve our health and benefit our communities and social structure. That early funding

helped Iowa's dairy production grow to be second in the U.S. by 1900, trailing only New York.

The dairy cow is a marvelous animal that can convert crops that we cannot utilize or like very much into nature's most nearly perfect food so good and so good for us!

Further processing of the milk into an ever-growing variety of healthful, delicious products increases dairy usage and helps sustain our economy.

To that end, ISDA continues to advocate for more in-state processing that will give our consumers more local product choices, lessen transportation costs and increase competition and farm prices for our milk. This added processing in Iowa can add value in our state instead of sending those jobs elsewhere. We continue to learn of more health benefits from dairy

consumption. Dairy proteins are by far the highest quality and milk's calcium is better utilized than the ground limestone in imitation products. Further, an eight-ounce serving of milk contains 8 grams of protein while eight ounces of almond nut juice has only 1 gram.

The young people from our dairy farms continue to showcase their talents, abilities and skills wherever they go. Dairy people are special!

The utilization of forage crops and pasture by our cattle can encourage more acres devoted to these soilsaving crops. Combined with reducing tillage and cover crops, our cattle can help tie up carbon from the air into soil organic matter, which also helps increase crop yields while reducing some input costs.

I believe that we do need to increase our efforts to showcase our industry and remind the public of Dairy's value to our economy, health, environment and social structure.

butter cow at the Iowa State Fair for more than 40 years. The statue originally sat outside of Duffy's hometown of Toledo until it was damaged by a derecho in 2020. The cow/calf statue was repaired, repainted and rehomed to Iowa's Dairy Center in the summer of 2022. It now greets the 10,000 annual visitors to the Dairy Center.

The Foundation continues to be focused farmer education, hosting several events this fall. At the end of October, we held a forage field day that discussed alternative forage production and cover crop management. In addition, another successful bovine artificial insemination course was held in partnership with Select Sires MidAmerica. The Iowa State University Extension and Outreach Dairy Team has a heavy educational focus this year and upcoming on "Feeding Dairy for all it's Worth - Understanding and managing nutritional and economic risks of feeds". The program encompasses understanding the value of forages, implications of forage composition on cow performance, human factors that affect consistency in feed management, pricing schemes for forages and demonstration of new technology available to improve forage quality.

This fall a webinar discussion series was offered to provide timely topics around silage harvesting, processing, storage, and feeding strategies and featured a producer discussing practical management strategies and information that can be readily implemented. Currently educational field days are being offered throughout Iowa to present and assess feeding practices than impact profitability of dairy farms. 

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

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
