Daisy's facility reportedly requires milk from almost 40,000 cows when operating at full capacity.

Mariah and I had the privilege of meeting with U.S. Secretary of Agriculture Brooke Rollins at a roundtable discussion with other commodity groups earlier in April. Everyone present felt heard and that their concerns were duly noted.

Our team is committed to positioning Iowa as the top destination for dairy farming and processing. The combination of prime farmland, ample water, and our exceptional farmers allows us to produce commodities that feed our livestock and the world, using the best stewardship practices that have been perfected over generations.

On May 7th and 8th, Mariah, Lee Maassen, and I attended the State Dairy Association Meeting at the National Milk Producers Federation (NMPF) headquarters in Arlington, Virginia. There were more than 40 representatives from 20 different states in attendance. Topics discussed included trade, the SAFETY Act—which aims to protect the use of common names for products produced by American farmers and companies from UK enforcement of geographical indicators that could

block US agricultural products from key international markets. Other topics included the Whole Milk for Healthy Kids Act, which seeks to reintroduce whole milk and flavored options in schools, as well as HPAI and immigration/labor issues.

After hearing the reports from other state associations, we feel very fortunate to live and conduct business in Iowa.

Executive Director's Report

A Toast to Progress: Celebrating June Dairy Month



As we kick off June Dairy Month, there's a lot to celebrate across Iowa's dairy industry. For the first time since 2009, fluid milk sales

are trending upward, which is driven by milk's unmatched combination of great taste, essential nutrients like protein, and everyday affordability. These qualities continue to set real dairy apart from plant-based imitators. That's why ISDA has been proud to support and advocate for legislation in Iowa aimed at protecting the industry from the misbranding of fake and imitation dairy products.

With Iowa's legislative session wrapping up in mid-May, we're pleased to report that \$500,000 has been allocated to the Dairy Innovation Fund for the next grant cycle. Additionally, extra funding has been designated to strengthen our foreign animal disease response, including efforts related to Highly Pathogenic Avian Influenza. ISDA also worked on increasing milk hauling weight limits, which we expect to revisit next year, and provided input on digester-related legislation. We also remained firm in our opposition to expanding the sale of raw milk to retail outlets.

On the federal level, we're closely monitoring progress on the next Farm Bill and any developments in trade policy. We're optimistic about the momentum behind the Whole Milk for Healthy Kids Act, which would help bring whole and flavored milk options back into schools. ISDA remains committed to supporting this important initiative and giving children access to the full nutritional benefits of real milk.

Last month, I had the opportunity to

join Robert Horst and Lee Maassen at the State Dairy Association Summit, hosted by the National Milk Producers Federation. We connected with dairy leaders from across the country, gained insight into national economic trends, and concluded our trip with productive advocacy meetings on Capitol Hill—championing Iowa's dairy farmers and the broader U.S. dairy industry.

With dairy consumption reaching its highest level since the 1950s, ISDA is committed to ensuring Iowa's dairy industry continues to grow, innovate, and thrive. It's been a busy and productive first half of the year, and we're moving into the second half with strong momentum.

This June, I invite you to raise a glass of milk in honor of the hard work and dedication of Iowa's dairy farmers.

ISDA Recognizes Keeling Leadership Award Winners

ISDA presented the Ralph Keeling Leadership Award to state dairy leaders at the association's annual meeting held in Ames. The award is presented annually to two Iowans who have shown outstanding leadership in Iowa's dairy industry. This award is in honor of the late Ralph Keeling. Keeling operated a successful dairy farm and business, devoting much of his time and talents to progressing Iowa's dairy industry.

The first recipient was Molly Pelzer of Tipton who was recognized for her leadership in the dairy checkoff. She began her work as a program director working with schools and health care professionals to eventually being named CEO of Midwest Dairy in 2019. Through her leadership, Midwest Dairy focused on maximizing the dairy farmers' investment in the dairy checkoff by strategic collaboration with targeted retailers, foodservice, wellness,

and industry partners, as well as focusing on research that leads to the development of solutions for industry and consumer needs. Pelzer retired from Midwest Dairy in the spring of 2024. During her tenure, she played a critical role in building trust and demand for the dairy industry and enjoyed working closely with the farmer-led boards.

The second recipient was Tom Simon of Farley. Simon farms in a multi-family partnership where they milk

560 Holsteins and operate over 500 acres of corn and alfalfa. In 2021, they built a robot barn to expand the herd. Simon has implemented an extensive IVF program to amplify the best genetics in his herd. Not only has his passion for genetics impacted his herd, but he helped improve the genetic progress of the Holstein breed, creating leading bulls that improve overall efficiency and profitability. Simon has been heavily involved in progressing the dairy industry in Iowa through years of progressive breeding as well as the leadership of the various boards and committees he's been a part of. He served as president of the Iowa Holstein Association, has been involved in local milk and sire cooperative boards and gives numerous tours every year to local community members as well as international visitors to help showcase the state's dairy industry.

Iowa Secretary of Ag Mike Naig Announces 15 Winners of Choose Iowa Dairy Innovation Grants

Grants will incorporate labor saving technology, increase on-farm processing

The cost-share grants will help expand on-farm dairy processing and incorporate labor saving technology, both of which will help to increase the availability of Iowa dairy products for consumers to enjoy. The announcement was made at the Iowa State University Creamery in Ames, which was awarded a grant to expand cheese processing at their on-campus facility.

"The Choose Iowa Dairy Innovation

Grant Program helps Iowa dairy farms by offering cost-share grants for new processing equipment or labor-saving technologies. Ultimately, consumers will benefit by enjoying a wider variety of Iowa dairy products," said Secretary Naig. "With funding for 15 projects, this program not only bolsters Iowa's dairy industry but also supports the growth of these farms and the vitality of the surrounding communities."

Choose Iowa received 33 grant requests totaling \$1,568,230.73, a figure that was more than twice the \$750,000 that was appropriated. The cost-share grants match up to \$100,000 per project. The 15 projects will leverage a total investment of \$4,127,863.81. In the first year of the

grant, the \$750,000 in state funding leveraged more than \$2.2 million in total investment across the 20 projects.

"Iowa State Dairy Association is excited to celebrate the announcement of the Dairy Innovation Grant recipients. Now in its second year, this program has seen strong demand and demonstrated significant impact on Iowa's dairy community," said Robert Horst, a dairy farmer from Bristow and President of the Iowa State Dairy Association. "Whether funding initiatives to address labor challenges on the farm, or providing equipment to expand dairy processing, the grant program is making a difference for dairy farmers and Iowans alike. We look forward to the continued success of this program, which supports Iowa dairy farm families and enhances access to Iowa-made dairy products."

The grants are assisting dairies with investments in pasteurization equipment, packaging and bottling products, milking robots, health monitoring, automated feeding systems, cleaning assistance, and much more. The program funds are not eligible to cover start-up costs, advertising, public relations, salary/ benefits/wages, existing debt or any expenses incurred prior to awarding the grant. With the legislative intent of assisting smaller dairies and farmers, grant awardees must be in Iowa, have fewer than 50 employees, and be in good standing with pertinent regulatory agencies. Only dairies permitted and inspected by the Iowa Department of Agriculture and Land Stewardship were eligible.



Midwest Dairy will continue to work with influencers throughout the year to create a surround sound message resonating with key audiences.






















